Project 1: Magoffin Home Archives Internship Division(s): Historic Sites Division **Department(s)/Site/Program(s):** Magoffin Home State Historic Site Academic level best suited for this project: ☐ Undergraduate ☐ Graduate ☒ Either **Project Description:** Students will join the staff and volunteers of the Magoffin Home State Historic Site, in El Paso, Texas, to execute a multi-stage archival processing project. The Magoffin Home Archive contains a substantial number of manuscripts in English and Spanish, as well as photographs, which document the history of the Magoffin and Glasgow families, the history of the home, and the cultural life and civic development of El Paso, Juarez, and the border region. There are also a substantial number of military papers and paper related to the life and artwork of Octavia Magoffin Glasgow, the last living descendant to live in the home. Project Description: The Recorded Texas Historic Landmark (RTHL) designation is a critical tool used to preserve and promote Texas' historic structures. Some counties contain over 100 RTHLs. In 2022, County Historical Commissions (CHC) were asked to conduct photo surveys of their RTHLs and submit the results to the Texas Historical Commission. You will work with CHCs to learn about their efforts to photograph, review and assess historically designated properties. You will develop training materials, and supplemental content for the CHC listserv, THC website, and social media to increase awareness of this preservation effort.

While there are many programs already done and being used, there is a need for new programs. Examples of programs that we are seeking out are self-guided programs that can be run in specific areas of the property and programs based on occurrences in San Felipe de Austin that are not tied to specific buildings (such as games, or militia). The intern project will include researching, writing, and potentially implementing/test running programming based on San Felipe de Austin.

Project Description:
As part of our strategic effort to add more original content and hard-to-find destinations to Texas Time Travel, the Heritage Tourism Program has partnered with the History Programs Division to promote experiences related to the stories behind Undertold Markers. The aim of this project is to survey over 230 THC Undertold Markers and add extant sites to our heritage tourism website as potential heritage travel destinations. In addition, scholars will have the opportunity to integrate these sites into fuller travel experiences by creating online itineraries that combine digital mapping, suggested side-trips, and long-form narratives that expand on the history of a location. These editorial features will be published on the Texas Time Travel blog under the scholar's name as part of their publication portfolio. Completing this project wil involve surveying digital Undertold Marker files; conducting additional research as needed; time spent with the CMS platform to build webpages on TexasTimeTravel.com; close collaboration with both heritage tourism and communications staff; and of course, lots of writing and storytelling.

Project Description:
The First Friday News for Friends is a bi-monthly e-newsletter for historic sites partner nonprofits
(typically known as "friends groups.") The newsletter provides opportunities for nonprofit training
and resources, and features activities at historic sites. As part of this internship, however, the
intern would not only research, collect and develop content for the newsletter, but also provide a
special feature during their tenure: researching and writing about the history of nonprofits and
the role of nonprofits in society versus corporate and government structures. This may include
topics such as the role of nonprofits in consensus decision making; garnering public support and
advocacy; demonstrating public will; the role and importance of public-private/government
partnerships; and stories of nonprofits that achieved major historical successes. The intern will
further learn about nonprofit governance, partnership agreements, and will support staff in
building and maintaining partnership agreements between historic sites and nonprofits. Optional

Project Description: The state of Texas has more than 190,000 miles of rivers and other vital waterways, many of which historically served as important conduits for moving goods and people throughout the region. As settlement and immigration was increasing during the 1700s and 1800s, hundreds of river crossings, ferry landings, and river ports were created to help ford these important inland arteries and capitalize on their use as strategic supply distribution routes. Modernization of transportation infrastructure and the decline of steam river traderesulted in the abandonment of these early sites, most of which are now known through historical accounts and maps. The Texas Historical Commission (THC) State Waterway Archeology Mapping Project seeks to "rediscover" the states' river crossings, tribal crossings, ferry launches, and forgotten river ports as the basis of a geospatial mapping project. The collated data can help archeologists identify areas that have a high potential to yield such archeological sites, and any associated shipwrecks, so they can be better protected in advance of construction and development projects. The intern project will include research, geospatia mapping using ESRI ArcMAP, and coordination with volunteers from the THC's Texas Archeologica Stewardship Network (TASN) and other groups in the submission and compilation of information for the geospatial database. The project may include the development of content for a future virtual exhibit of agency web page and on-site assessments.
